

# Nedra Tyre

**Nedra Tyre** (October 6, 1912 – 1990) was an American social worker and author specializing in crime fiction.<sup>[1]</sup>

A native of Offerman, Georgia, Tyre attended Emory University and the Richmond School of Social Work.<sup>[2]</sup> She had professional stints as a librarian, clerk, and advertising copy writer, in addition to her fiction and social work.<sup>[3]</sup> Her book reviews appeared in The Richmond News Leader and The Atlanta Journal.<sup>[2]</sup>

Tyre died in Richmond, Virginia in 1990.
